right as a parent to protect the un-born fetus from family violence.

He testified during the hearing that, "I do believe it is a violent act. I believe it is murder."

But in questioning Hayes on the witness stand, Goldstein slammed the husband's assertions of "deeply seated" beliefs against such violence, citing that the man had been convicted of raping a former wife

Goldstein also produced documents that revealed Hayes had fathered two other children from other women but had not paid for any type of child support for the youngsters.

The attorney also questioned Hayes about an incident in which he admitted to paying a \$40 fine in connection with a simple assault

case.
"If ever there was someone more unfit to speak to family violence. this individual is one," Goldstein said in closing arguments.

During her testimony, Mrs. Hayes claimed the pregnancy was a surprise to her because her husband had told her that he had undergone a vasectomy.

"I consider what is inside me now like a cancer, I despise it. I want it to go away, and if it won't go away I'll make it go away." To that answer, Rogers asked,

"Are you aware that this cancer you refer to is a miniature baby?" The woman replied that she did

not consider the fetus to be a baby

Asked if she felt she had the right to solely decide whether to terminate the pregnancy, Mrs. Hayes replied:

"But then, where were my rights when he told me he had a vasectomy?

"I think he wanted to get somebody pregnant so he could have his own little play thing."

She admitted that the day before yesterday's hearing she visited two physicians seeking an abortion.

Those attempts were thwarted by Hayes' attorney with some assistance from 73rd District Judge James Onion, who issued the restraining order.

Testimony also was given yester-day by a physician who had examined the woman last week and determined her to be 13 to 14 weeks pregnant, not 20 weeks as Hayes
